MEMPHIS — Located in the newly renovated Cyclone Building, 605 West Main St., Panhandle Community Services (PCS) shares the spacious office suits with Dale Miller's Millwood Properties, while PCS Communications Specialist Bianca Ramos and PCS Family Development Specialist Katherine Monroe greet clients with a wealth of knowledge.

With the Memphis site servicing Collingsworth, Donley and Hall County residents, PCS offers an array of services, explained by PCS Utility Specialist Marcia Campbell, including a water program.

"The water program helps

PCS announces new board member

my father a resident. When they arrived, they didn't qualify for government help, and the jobs available were paid on a lower wage scale. From that experience, along with marrying my husband at a young age. to now being owners together in a successful family business, you can imagine I have been on all levels of the income scale. I feel honored to bring my experiences to an organization that is changing lives and leading change."

A unique aspect of the Board of Directors from PCS is that they make up what is called a "tripartite board" consisting of equal representation from the low-income sector, the private sector, and elected officials. This structure brings together community leaders from each group to develop robust responses to local community needs. Panhandle Community Services has a new office in Friona at 901 Main Street and is currently hiring a communications specialist.

Headquartered in Amarillo, Texas, PCS has 12 service centers to assist the top of Texas. They are a Community Action Agency and work hard with their community partners to change lives and lead change in the lives of low-income people. All of the programs PCS facilitates are geared toward walking local citizens out of poverty. These include the rural county bus system, housing, and utility assistance, a family development program, and more. Find complete information on www. panhandlehelp.org.

us and wait for payment. We have lots of utility assistance available."

As an added bonus, the Hygiene Closet also launched during the Monday, April 17 celebration.

"The closet provides basic hygiene items, like soap, shampoo, cleaning products and more," Campbell said. "Families and anyone who has a need may visit the Hygiene Closet once a month. We accept hygiene donations as well as monetary help, to keep the closet stocked."

"When it comes to hygiene items, you can't buy these items with food stamps," PCS Amarillo Director of Family Services Audra Rea added. "We have people choosing between shampoo or deodorant. We talk about how we want people to better themselves, but sometimes it's unduly burdensome. We want to lift some of that burden with our Hygiene Closet."

Also available, the Housing Choice Voucher Program subsidizes housing costs, allowing low-income individuals and families to live in quality housing, Rea explained.

"We can assist homeowner who are behind on mortgage or property tax payments," she said.

Covering all 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle, local staff work alongside support specialists in Amarillo to "change the lives of low-income people by bridging the gap from poverty to self-sufficiency."

PSC Career Coach Jennifer Brock also has suggestions for clients seeking help with issues getting a job.

"We assist with building resumes and cover letters, job referrals, outcoming applications, networking and interview skills," Brock said. "There's something out there for everyone. We also have information on 14-week programs to become a plumber or firefighter and how to move from just a job to a career."

From career coaching, transportation, family development, utility assistance, housing and weatherization to the Retired and Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP) and health navigators, plus Restoring America's Heroes and emergency assistance available to veterans, PCS is dedicated

to helping people help themselves and each other.




